Britain's Lost Masterpieces

Art Podcasts

First a recap on podcasts:

Podcasts are like having your own radio station with just programmes you have chosen: listen to what you want, when you want.

First of all you need to have a podcast player to play the podcast(!)

Apple devices (iPhone, iPad) will have the Apple podcast player already installed.





Android devices will have the Google podcast player.

Using your podcast player you can "subscribe" to podcasts that interests you (at no cost) and they will be sent, as if by magic, to you and will appear on your Podcast. You then simply play them whenever you

want.

Facebook tracking and Off Facebook Activity

Jane, one of our group, asked me to comment on a video forwarded to her from a rather hysterical American lady.

The lady was concerned, to put it mildly, that Facebook was monitoring all that you do on your device, even when Facebook wasn't being used. She claimed (incorrectly), that Facebook tracks every app including your on-line banking.

I use Facebook so I decided to investigate.

Facebook makes a huge amount of money from businesses and organisations who want to advertise in your Facebook newsfeed. That's OK: they have to make money somehow.

However here is an example of a situation which really happened: In my Facebook, amongst the normal news from the Archers and Surrey Cricket club was an advert for Bath Museum. This was odd because I was looking at staying in Bath in **another app**. Is it a coincidence that the advert for Bath Museum appeared or is something happening here?

Facebook explain it using an example (they actually use "Jane" in their example!)

- 1. Jane buys shoes from an online shoe shop.
- 2. The online shop shares Jane's purchase with Facebook
- 3. Facebook adds the purchase to Jane's Facebook details
- 4. When Jane is in Facebook a specific targeted advertisement (eg offering 10% off shoes) appears in front of her.

So

- 1. Facebook is not monitoring all your computer activity.
- 2. Business and organisations **decide** whether to give information to Facebook.
- 3. Banks would never pass confidential details to Facebook. If they did, they would very soon have no customers at all.

However some people may be uncomfortable with this so you can stop it by doing the following:

In Facebook go to

- 1. Settings
- 2. Scroll down to Your Facebook information
- 3. Go to Off-Facebook activity (interestingly this did not appear on my iPad but did on my iPhone)
- 4. More Options
- 5. Manage Future Activity, twice
- 6. Turn off Future off-Facebook activity

I had 105 apps sending information to Facebook including Economist, getSurrey, Walesonline, Cancerresearch, Independent newspaper, Which magazine and Surrey cricket.

I have **not** turned it off yet. If I do, will I get adverts for items I have no interest in?



Scams

We have reported scams regularly for, it seems, years. They have usually been the "phishing" type, ie millions of emails are sent to a list of addresses in the hope that just a few will "bite" and reveal details or send money.

However in January my mother received the following from a **friend's** email address, not an "odd" address the scammers normally use.

Good Morning,

I need a favor from you.

Do you have an Amazon Account?

Thank you, Penny

Her friend is indeed called Penny and the email address is correct. However there was no personal greeting and an American spelling of favour. Nevertheless my mother replied that she did have an Amazon account. The reply to this was:

Nice to hear from you. I've been trying to purchase a Amazon £300 Gift card by email, but it says they are having issues charging my card. I contacted my bank and they told me it would take a couple of days to get it sorted. I intend to buy it for a friend of mine she is down with cancer of the Liver, It's her birthday and I promised to get her Amazon gift cards. Can you purchase it from your end for me, I 'll refund it to you once my bank sorts the issue out. Let me know so i can send you her email.

Thanks, Penny

This time the warning bells rang. There was no personal greeting, the grammar was bad and the "sting" has been revealed. What was interesting/worrying was that the scammers/criminals had got access to Penny's email account and were replying individually to emails sent to her. They were not phishing but directly targeting people in Penny's contact list. My mother rang Penny and found that many other friends had been in touch having received similar emails. Penny soon changed her email password. How did the criminals get her email password? We don't know.

So if you receive an email from anybody, even friends, asking for personal details or money, **double-check** by telephone or another method.

iPad Stands

A search of Amazon produced a number of iPad stands which seemed to fit the bill and chose a Lamicall. Here is what she said about it:


I'm quite pleased with this as it's meant I've got rid of most books under and behind the iPad as it's secure and a little higher.
