




The BBC (and the other TV stations) did a fantastic job of covering the whole period from the Queen's death to the





## Gas and Electricity: USwitch

Gas and electricity prices have increased enormously recently so it is a good idea to check that you are on the best tariff. There are a number of comparison websites to help you choose and one of the best known and well respected sites is USwitch. 
USwitch is a free, independent price comparison service that helps consumers compare gas and electricity prices and switch energy suppliers to save money.

Since 2006 USwitch has been fully accredited by the Ofgem Confidence Code. With many energy comparison sites to choose from, USwitch has been one of the longest standing signatories to the Ofgem code, and a primary contributor to achieving gas and electricity pricing transparency.



USwitch makes money based on commercial agreements with some

energy suppliers. They charge suppliers a fee when they switch customers to them, which means they can provide consumers with a free service. Their commercial relationships help make the switching process as simple as possible for customers and in some cases allow them to negotiate exclusive deals that are not available directly from the supplier.



USwitch tries to include as many suppliers and products on the market in their comparisons as possible. However there are circumstances where a supplier or a product cannot be included in their search – for example, they may not be able to show a supplier's products because they do not have an agreement with them or because they do not wish to be included in a comparison.

The data they use to calculate your results for their energy switching services is provided directly by suppliers. They monitor all suppliers continually and update their site regularly

to ensure their results are comprehensive and accurate.

In the example above here I simply entered my Postcode and address and Uswitch immediately came back with advice **not** to change. There are no cheaper alternatives.

Now, who left that light on!


### **Utility Warehouse**

# Insurance and other comparisons


There are other comparison sites covering just about everything you need. Car insurance is another expense and it is worth checking every year.


Car insurance is an expensive necessity (if you have a car, of course) and it is worth checking you are getting the best possible deal.

Here is an example of car insurance using gocompare.com



1.Enter car details. By entering the reg number the car details will be found and displayed. You will need to enter date bought, modifications etc

2. More details about the car are entered, including where it is normally parked.



3. Personal details then


need to be entered including how long you have been driving, date of birth, occupation and so on.


# Buying goods from shops.


You can save money when you need to buy a new TV, or toaster, or in fact anything.


This example shows the range of prices for a popular television.

This example shows a search for a toaster and buying from Zoro is cheaper than other suppliers.





#### Scams

Age UK have a very useful website with comprehensive information about all type of scams and fraud.

Scammers now have the technology to mimic an official telephone number so it comes up or your calter ID display (if you have one on your phone). This can trick you into thinking the calter is really from a legitimate organisation, such as a bank or utility company. If you're in any doubt, hang up and call the organisation directly, if possible, call them from different phone as scammers can keep the phone line open, so that even if you hang up and call the organisation directly, the Ine may still be connected to the scammer. If it's not possible to use another phone then wait for at least 10 minutes before you call.




